

Popoki's Interview



*We have been conducting interviews with Popoki's friends in different places and asking about their experiences during the COVID-19 pandemic. This is the first of a 2-part series by Yakonyan about pets in the Czech Republic.

Interviewer: Yakonyan/ Interviewee: Lucienyan

Yakonyan

Hello. I interviewed Lucienyan. She is my classmate in Cultural Studies. She worked at a non-profit organisation for pets in the Czech Republic. This time I asked her some questions from the view of peace and pets during the COVID-19 pandemic (The latter half of the interview will be in next month's issue of Popoki News).

Q1) What kinds of activities did you do regarding pet animals in Czech Republic?

The organisation I work at (called Pet Heroes) has a lot of different projects, all of them focusing on helping animals in need. Most of our time and resources are dedicated to direct care for animals, but we also have education programs for both the general public and other animal non-profits. When it comes to direct care, there are two distinct projects. One is a city shelter that is under our organisation - it functions like a standard municipal shelter in the Czech Republic, meaning we take in animals without owners (which can mean stray animals, ones who have been abandoned, or even who have been taken away from their owners by the police because of mistreatment and animal abuse). Other than that, however we focus on handicapped or special needs animals. These are usually placed in foster care, as they often require more specific attention than a shelter can provide. They also often come to us from other shelters who cannot offer the medical care which is often expensive. We try to find a new forever home for every animal in our care, which is why the organisation pledges to always pay veterinary expenses that are caused by the handicap. As there is usually no insurance for pets, these expenses can be quite high and most ordinary people would not be able to afford them.

I personally have two handicapped cats. One has lost one eye due to infection and has an autoimmune disease. The other lost two legs in an accident and now has prosthetics. They are both wonderful and deal with their handicaps without any issue ③ I however know that by myself I could never have provided for the cost of the prosthetics or the medicine for autoimmune disease.

We also try to facilitate cooperation between non-profits who share our goals! I for example oversee a storage of communal supplies, such as food, beds, medicine and other things. These are usually donated by people who want to help or sometimes charity drives organized around Christmas, etc. We then sort through the items and try to shift everything to where it's most needed.

This is a picture of my cat (his name is Mojito) shortly after the surgery in which he received his prosthetics (you can see that the fur on his hind legs hasn't grown back yet)

Q2) How has been COVID-19 situation in Czech Republic?

The first wave of COVID saw quite strong lock down measures, but thanks to that, there were relatively few deaths. As society became less compliant with the preventive measures however, the number of infected people (and of deaths) increased. The majority of the population is now vaccinated, but the effects of the pandemic are still felt. Many people lost their jobs and struggled to find new ones, and businesses had to close down. Also, during the most intense time of the pandemic, hospitals temporarily stopped providing non-essential surgeries, to make more space for hospitalising patients with COVID. These surgeries are now being performed again, but it impacted people with for example, joint implants.

Q3) How have pet animals been affected by the COVID-19 pandemic?

The effect on animals was two-fold. First, as many people faced financial difficulties, they also struggled to provide for their pets. During COVID, we used a lot of the aforementioned supplies to give directly to people who were now struggling to get by. The second effect was somewhat less expected. There were people who during the lockdown, when everyone who could work from home did so, got a new pet. During that time, they could care

for it. However, when they had to go back to work in person, many of them found it unsustainable and wanted to get rid of the animal. Shortly after the lockdown was lifted, we saw an increase in animals who ended up in shelters. (To be continued next month).



A Request from Popoki's Friend

Ms. Cecilia Jimenez-Damary, Special Rapporteur on the human rights of internally displaced persons, is expected to visit Japan to investigate the situation of international displaced persons. Special Rapporteurs are independent experts appointed by the U.N. Human Rights Council to report on specific issues.

During her visit, she is expected to be talking with government officials as well as local citizens. On the part of the local community, it will be necessary to have funding for staff to accompany Ms. Jiminez-Damary, transportation costs, interpreters, translators, etc. In order to meet these expenses, we are calling on concerned people for contributions.


It has been 11 years since the Fukushima accident, but more than 30,000 people continue to be displaced and are living under difficult circumstances. As you all know well, Japan is a country that has many disasters. There is no way of knowing when or where the next disaster will strike. Keeping this in mind, Ms. Cecilia Jiminez-Damary, Special Rapporteur on the human rights of internally displaced people, is planning to make an official visit to Japan beginning 26 September 2022. It is hoped that many people will recognize that the rights to life, dignity, freedom and safety of displaced people must not be violated during displacement, as outlined in the "Guiding Principles on Internal Displacement" and in international human rights law.

What Popoki Means to Me

I have touched Popoki's fluffy hair, when I visited Ronni sensei's (or Ronyan's) home. It is already almost 20 year's ago, I guess. I was trying to be his friend, but Popoki might not feel so nice. He got angry at me, and then said "No!" (maybe) in order to protest against my act. Ronni sensei told me that he was irritated, so it is better not to touch him. I thought he would feel good by being touched, but it was just my wrong impression. Some of Popoki's hair was left on my black fleece jacket, and it was my first and last physical contact with him.


I really think that it is tremendously difficult thing to be friends or understand each other. Popoki might dislike me, only leaving some hair on me. On the other hand, I did not intend to hurt him. On the contrary, my heart was filled with friendship. But, at that moment, peace and relief disappeared from him. Those things might often happen when "we" think that "we" are doing good to others, and accelerate "our" goodness, being blind to other's feelings and situation. Those things might happen not only between humans (or humans and cats), but also between some organizations, or between nations. As a result, our world might be filled with enormous violence and destruction.

Therefore, I really think that it is very difficult to realize peace, or a world with no war and no violence. I can't help thinking that those conflicts do not happen because of some evil people with evil intention. But on the contrary, people are trying to do good things for others, but it is far from those other people want or need. I can't help thinking that sad and tragic situations are caused by those kinds of misunderstandings. Just like Popoki shouted at me with fear, when I showed my friendly feeling to him.

How can we solve that misunderstanding? I don't have any reasonable answer, and that answer would never be found. But, still, we can learn. From tragic history, or from other country's situations, we can try to imagine whether we are making the same mistake or not. Popoki's project is one of those imaginative and learning opportunities for me. (But honestly speaking, I haven't joined in Popoki's activity for a while, so I can't say anything much, actually). If I could meet Popoki again, (not in a book, but in person) I would enjoy looking at his pretty face and body, and let him rest without disturbing him. Thanks to Popoki's project, I learn some, and I can imagine some. I want to make use of what I have learned from Popoki and his friends. That is what Popoki means to me. The picture I attached is the wall which divides Palestine and Israel. (I joined the trip to Palestine from Popoki's project in August, 2008). For both sides, there are complicated stories and justice. I tried to figure out those complications, but still, I don't have any good answer. Did I really learn anyhing? Well, still, I want to believe that it might be important to keep thinking....
