特 Special Issue: Global Article 9 Conference in Makuhari!



Members of the Popoki Peace Project participated in the Global Article 9 Conference from 4-6 May at Makuhari Messe, a conference center outside of Tokyo. We conducted a workshop (5/5, 10:00-12:30) on Popoki and Article 9 and had a booth (5/4, 5/5) at which we sold Popoki's book,

(http://whynot9.jp) Popoki postcards and stickers. Ronni was also on a panel on the "Danger and Future of Article Nine," sponsored by the conference organizers. 1. My hope for POPOKI goods!

At the beginning of May, the Global Article 9 Conference was held in Makuhari Messe. It was unfortunate that I couldn't join in, but I supported the effort by helping to make postcards and stickers that were sold at the Popoki Peace Project booth in Makuhari. In advance, we discussed which Popoki cards were the cutest at a *po-kai* meeting, and 17 patterns were chosen. We worked snacking on sweets and fruit in Prof. Alexander's office. 2. The Global Article 9 Conference (Satoko) The Workshop

In the train on the way to Makuhari, I recruited a student to come to the workshop. He asked me, "What is Popoki?" It turns out that he had been curious ever since seeing Popoki's name in the program on the first day (the workshop was on day 2).

The workshop was first thing in the morning, at a time when a lot of people planning to attend had still not arrived.

We were worried about whether there would be very many people, but a total of about 45 people came,

People who came were interested in Article 9, so it is hardly surprising that they discussed issues of peace with enthusiasm in the workshop.





When the participants began work on their creative projects, even though they were worried about not having enough time

to finish, everyone seemed to be enjoying themselves, looking happy and glowing with energy. They all made wonderful *kamishibai* (story boards), mobiles and peace paths.

We tried many new things at this



workshop, and the team work among our members was really

successful. Not just the reading of Popoki's Peace Book, but the entire workshop was bilingual in Japanese and English.

We had some trouble with the conference organizers regarding things like the way the room was set up which left me with a bad feeling, but seeing everybody smiling made me feel much better.

The room was too small for the crowd of displayers and booths. From their midst, many people caught sight of the huge Popoki and exclaiming how cute he was, they would come and visit our booth.

With so many people,

it was almost impossible to stop and look at the booth without being pushed from behind. Even so, some people stopped and asked questions like, "Popoki is such an interesting name. What does it mean?





Our booth was in a far corner, so by the time they got to us, many people had to apologize because they had already spent all their money. We supplied those people with information so they could order the book later. In spite of the crowds, some people stayed by our booth until

they had read the entire book. Some of them said what a good book it was...and then didn't buy it. We gave those people order forms, too.

On the second day, Mori-san and Urai-san made friends with someone who had a booth closer to the entrance and were invited to use that location, too. They went back and forth between the two booths.

We sold postcards and stickers for the first time, and



they were popular. Some children stayed for a long time, and occasionally they were rewarded with a spontaneous reading...

there were lots of people, the room was dusty and we were all hoarse, in comparison with the other booths, the Popoki Peace Project booth was warm and comforting, not only for us but for others as well..


I enjoyed the workshop when the participants worked together and created

I'm so glad to know about your worldwide activities from reading 'Popoki News.' Ronni sends it to me and I am impressed a lot by Popoki Power to promote peace everywhere.

It might interest you to know that your book has been very active in my English lessons, too. My students practice reading English sentences aloud, using good pronunciation and intonation. At the same time, they are asked to read the Japanese sentences, also with perfection.

It is very important for Japanese students to know the meaning of the English sentences they are studying. *Popoki, What Color is Peace?* is an ideal textbook because it is written both in English and Japanese. I truly enjoy reading it with my students, imagining Popoki's voice and gestures from Ronni's pictures and text.

Take a look at this picture. One of my students looked up the meaning of unfamiliar words in the dictionary and wrote them down on post-its. She wants to keep her book clean, so she doesn't write the meaning directly on the page. Take a close look at it. You see also the phonetic signs. She practices reading the sentences with good pronunciation. In doing so, she feels you, Popoki, are just beside her.



I know you will keep visiting more places, not only in Japan but also all over the world to meet more people. So wonderful!!! I hope you enjoy every single new encounter. Take care.
